
Principal's Newsletter

Dear Parents,

I keep to my promise of not sending you the Monthly Newsletter late!

- 1) Let me begin with a few highlights of the Academic programme:
 - a) PYP students practised mediation in class as part of their Mindfulness plan.
 - b) Grade-3 went on a field trip to the Zoo in connection with their Unit of Inquiry process of Change. It was fun-filled and a good learning experience for the students.
 - c) Grade-5 students went on a field trip to the Salar Jung museum as a part of their UOI process. In connection with their Unit of Inquiry on Imagination and Creativity, they were also introduced to the Design Thinking process and its stages.

d) IGCSE:

- i) The academic session for 2016-17 commenced on the 2nd of August with 38 Grade-9 students entering the IGCSE Programme with a lot of enthusiasm and expectations. The IGCSE Coordinator conducted the introductory orientation for subject selection on the 2nd of August. The teachers delivered individual subject presentations with regard to the scope of their subject for career choices.
- ii) The IGCSE May 2016 results were declared. With this, we had the complete set of results (November 2015, March 2016 & May 2016) for the IGCSE batch of 2016.

Abhishek Deb Bathina was the topper with 8 A*s & 3 As to his credit.

Ria Thimmaiahgari was second with 8 A*s and 1 A.

Congratulations to all parents and students. This is the first Board examination for our students and everyone would have been a little nervous.







Special congratulations to Abhishek and his family for their toil and the many sacrifices they made. Congratulations to Ria and her family, too, and the rest of the top performers for their achievements. May this result be only one in a long series of successes.

A few highlights of the results are:

- 1. 86% of our students received the International Certificate of Education, of which 33% have got a distinction.
- 2. 53% of our grades are A^* / A / B. This was 52% in 2015 & 44% in 2014. 32% of the grades are A^* / A, up 2% from the previous year.
- 3. 6 students have secured a combined total of at least 8 A*s & As this year. This was 5 in 2015 and no student achieved this feat in 2014.
- 4. The percentage of A*, A & B grades combined is the highest in the last 3 years in almost all the subjects, group-wise.

e) IBDP

Support classes started for Grade 12 from the 17th of August. Students finished their TOK Mock Presentation in August and have started preparing for the final one.







Grade 11 students had an IBDP orientation and an Orientation on Selection of Subjects spread across two days. They were given time for two weeks to sit through the classes to understand the subjects offered in DP and make informed choices. In the last week of the month they were introduced to the techniques of writing the Extended Essay.

2) WHOLE EDUCATION

This year, we have made a conscious effort to increase the Whole Education programmes across school and give as many opportunities to our students to develop themselves in areas beyond academic work.

a) In a national art competition hosted by the Kala-Mithra Foundation, Ujjwal Mantha of Grade 12 won a Gold medal. The theme of the competition was 'Swachh Bharat'. Congratulations, Ujjwal! (Please find as an attachment a picture of Ujwal's work.)

b) Independence Day:

Independence Day for India and for Korea was celebrated on the 15th of August. There were speeches by students from both countries; PYP students came dressed as important figures from the freedom movement; the choir sang two melodious patriotic songs. These were followed by an Inter-House debate competition for the IGCSE students. Rida Samreen of Orion House and Ananya Paripally of Pegasus House jointly won the 'Best Speaker' award. The motion for the debate was: "In the opinion of the House, India is a successful democracy."

The debate was followed by the IBDP Extempore competition. The topic was "THINK GLOBAL AND ACT LOCAL".

c) The first Inter-House Quiz Competitions were conducted on the 18th and 19th of August for the MSP and Seniors, respectively. Phoenix won both competitions.

The MSP had their Inter-House elocution on the 26th. Aditi K Mullapudi (Grade 6), Simridhi Sastry (Grade 7) and Utshaa Basu (Grade 8) stood first in their respective divisions. Orion stood 1st among the Houses.

Best out of Waste Inter-House competition: The MSP organized a Best-Out-Of-Waste competition on 11th August. The students recycled old, unused items to come up with various useful items. Phoenix was again the winner!

d) Students participated in the Harvard Model United Nations held at the Hyderabad International Convention Centre from 12th -15th August. Students represented the school in numerous prestigious committees under the guidance of Ms. Deepti Chitkara.







e) I omitted to mention this in the last newsletter, so I do it now. Twelve students took part during the Summer vacation in the Young Entrepreneur Challenge 2016 run by Boston University alumnus students. The competition aims at facilitating the students to be able to understand and experience the dynamics of a business right from conceiving an original idea until launching it into the market. Among other things, the students learned business concepts and terminology, improvised public speaking and presentation skills, financial planning and analysis – an extremely important learning concept for a budding entrepreneur – and, through their guided explorations of the Universities, about the life at Harvard, MIT and Georgetown.

The team that included Maalavika, Sachet and Ajay was the winning team. Two teams were in joint 2nd place. One team included Sivani, Tushaar and Surya while Nirmay and Tanmaya were in the other. (39 students from different countries were put into 8 teams.)

Suraj Kalidindi was awarded the prestigious YEC founder award.

Hearty congratulations to the students and Ms Indra Kola for mentoring them all through and giving of her time during the vacation to be with the students.

f) Insignia:

The Grade 11 students organized a fete for charity, Insignia. We collected Rs 3,28,530 as profit. This money will be used to complete the I-Care project of helping re-build the Kondakal Primary School. A big 'Thank You' to the Insignia Organizing Committee for the hard work put in. Thank you also to our sponsors, all other students, staff and parents for their contributions in different ways.

g) Sports:

We took part in the Basheeruddin Babu Khan Memorial Football Tournament organized by Glendale Academy. In the Under-18 Boys category, we defeated Chirec and Oakridge but lost to DPS in the semi-finals.

Our students also participated in the Inter-School Swimming Competition conducted by Glendale Academy. About fifteen schools participated in this competition.

8) Thoughts on Humility (and Usain Bolt)

When Jim Collins and a team of researchers studied eleven corporations that had moved from being good ones to great ones, they found that the CEOs were very driven people but they were also humble. Their employees used words like *shy*, *reserved*, *humble*, *self-effacing and gracious* to describe these leaders.

Humility does not mean we display a lack of confidence or that we think less of ourselves; it is that we think of ourselves less and think of others more. But humility is not a virtue that comes easily to us. We may wear it like a garment but, all too often, our pride, our vanity comes peeping through. Even the greatest are not above it; they must cultivate it consciously.







As a 12-year-old child, George Washington read a century-old Jesuit document, "The Rules of Civility and Decent Behavior in Company and Conversation." The lessons he learned in humility from that book stayed with him always: "Strive not with your superior in argument, but always submit your judgment to others with modesty," was the fortieth rule. "Play not the peacock," began rule number fifty-four.

In 1783, on the conclusion of the American War of Independence, he voluntarily renounced his military commission and became just a citizen. Later, he would willingly consent to the simple title of "Mr President".

Why do I talk about this rare and difficult virtue? Well, actually Usain Bolt made me think of it. The world was marvellling even before he had won the three golds this Olympics about his magnificent achievement, and rightly remained in awe of the man who was likely to do what what had never been done before. But Bolt said he would be "immortal" if he won the triple.

"I'm the greatest," he said. "I hope I've set the bar high enough that no one can do it again. I've proven to the world I'm the greatest. This is what I came here for. That's what I'm doing. This is why I said this is my last Olympics — I can't prove anything else. I am trying to be one of the greatest. Be among {Muhammad} Ali and Pelé. I hope to be in that bracket after these Games." (I have compiled statements made at different times.)

Well, that took the sheen off the great athlete.

Lord Krishna counsels Arjuna: You are only entitled to the action, not to its fruits. Do not let the fruits of action be your motive but do not attach yourself to inaction.

In the Book of Chronicles in the Bible, we have the line: For all things come from You, and of Your own have we given You.

Both quotes guard us against overweening pride. We are given abilities, gifts, talents, resources to use to help ourselves and to help / inspire others. Success in doing so is its own reward.

Prahlad Kakkar tells of the time he had shot a Pepsi advertisement with Tendulkar hitting cricket balls with abandon using a fly swatter. When Tendulkar was shown the film, he rang up Kakkar and asked him to re-do the scene. On being pressed for a reason, Tendulkar said that the use of the fly swatter made him appear bigger than the game; that was something he was averse to as he always believed that the game was bigger than an individual.

No bird ever flew on one wing. Humble people – no matter how successful – will always remember Rule No. 54 quoted above: *Play not the peacock*. Success, while it might well be earned, is never the result of only the successful person's work. At each turn in life, there







are people in the shadows who help us do what we do – and we should never forget those unsung angels. For his achievements, Washington never credited himself – always, others. When Tendulkar would score a century, he would look heavenward and raise his bat to the dressing room and the crowd. In his personal life, he was Tendulkar the person and not Tendulkar the cricketer.

Mohammed Ali, the great boxing legend, said of himself: 'It's hard to be humble, when you're as great as I am.' I suppose Usain Bolt would say the same of himself (!)

I have nothing against these phenomenal athletes; I, too, belong to the legions of their fans and I suppose these statements are part of what goes into the making of the hype that makes celebrities. But our children are privileged ones and in their formative years as they prepare for the successful years that we are sure will follow, we would do well to remind them of Jim Collins' study, and the lives of people like Sachin Tendulkar and George Washington – for greatness and humility are not incompatible.
